# STRAY THOUGHTS

## Bungee

Meet Bungee! He came from a pound in central Illinois. A kind citizen noticed Bungee languishing in a cold, wet pen and began an e-mail campaign to get him out before he would be euthanized. Many times, when back yard breeders or puppy mills determine that a dog's health is not 100%, they drop them off at the pound rather than spend money on medical treatment, so good dogs wind up in desperate situations.

At first glance, Bungee appeared to be healthy, although shy. Once in the kennel at WSHS, our staff was able to observe Bungee more closely. He seemed to step on his back feet and have little control over his hindquarters. In addition, Bungee had a painful bladder infection that may have begun months earlier. Our veterinarian immediately took X-rays of Bungee's back and hips, and also prescribed treatment for his bladder infection. Once the vet determined Bungee had hip dysplasia, a trip to the surgeon was in order. Within the first week of Bungee's arrival at WSHS, he had been examined, X-rayed and treated by many doctors and WSHS staff members. Through it all, Bungee maintained a sweet disposition, tolerating everything and making friends all over the place. You can't help but fall in love with Bungee when you look into his eyes. They tell you the horrors of where he has been as well as the love & loyalty he feels for his present caregivers.

Bungee suffered an additional blow shortly after his surgical examination. Due to Bungee's background, one vet suggested that a heartworm test would be a good idea before proceeding with the long process of two hip surgeries and subsequent recovery. Unfortunately, many dogs rescued from pounds have never had any form of preventative treatment or vaccines and heartworm is fairly prevalent. It turned out that Bungee had fallen prey to this dreaded disease. Left untreated, Bungee would have

died an agonizing death. Treatment for heartworm is an arduous process in itself. In order to kill the worms, a dog must be subjected to powerful toxins and monitored very carefully. Since the disease attacks the heart and lungs, Bungee cannot undergo anesthesia until heartworm treatment is completed and a negative heartworm test is performed several months from now.


Bungee currently lives in a loving temporary care home where he wants to be a typical 18- month old pup. Another difficulty with heartworm treatment is that the dog must be kept quiet and calm with no running or rambunctious play. Poor Bungee can't understand why he isn't allowed to act like a normal puppy of his age. These activities could also further damage Bungee's back and hips, so his foster family faces careful monitoring and the challenge of keeping a young dog calm. Although the hip surgeries had to be postponed indefinitely, Bungee takes many supplements to help him build muscle and keep arthritis at bay. He receives regular electroacupuncture in his back to alleviate a lack of sensation in his back legs and feet. Agua therapy (under water treadmill) would really aid in post-surgical recovery, but because of the heartworm, Bungee will have to forego this helpful therapy.

Months from now when Bungee becomes available for adoption, his adoptive family will feel they are the luckiest people in the world. Bungee bonds to people very easily, and can live with children and other dogs. He doesn't have experience with cats, but Bungee is eager to please and learns quickly. He has been house trained and crate trained in his temporary care home.

Upon his adoption, Bungee will be heartworm free & have perfectly working hips. He will be neutered and microchipped, with a brand spanking new collar and ID tag. He will have gained weight and muscle and have a great overall prognosis. He will be a well-behaved,

playfully active young boy who is current on vaccines. WSHS is happy to help Bungee. Once an animal is taken into our care, we are dedicated to its health and wellbeing. Sometimes our adoption fee covers the necessary care, but in many cases, as with Bungee's, the adoption fee is woefully insufficient. Double hip surgery alone will cost \$3000 - \$5000. Add to that the heartworm treatment, pre & post surgical therapies and all of the medications and supplements, and it is pretty clear we need help with Bungee's expenses. To date, about 1/4 of the money needed has been raised. Hopefully, by the time Bungee is ready to proceed with surgery, the funds will be in place, but we can't do it alone.


### 12.5-year old, Male, Brown Tabby w/White

### ANIMAL RESCUE - Are you prepared?

The other day, our doorbell rang and it was a neighbor reporting she had seen a stray puppy and had come to us for help. It was 14 degrees outside with a wind chill of 0 degrees. We were able to "capture" the dog after 20 minutes of work and then got the dog to our warm house and into a safe cage. The pup did not want to come with us, besides being very cold and scared, he was acting aggressively which is not normal for a 3-4 month old puppy.

We live in unincorporated DuPage County so we contacted the DuPage County Sheriff's non-emergency number (630-407-2400) for assistance because it was Sunday and the DuPage Animal Control (630-407-2800) was closed. Within one hour, the police came to be sure the dog was controlled and not a danger to anyone. The Sheriff's department then contacted the Animal Control staff, and they arrived in less than an hour to pick up the dog.

The dog had no collar and had not been "chipped" for identification. He would not allow anyone to come near his head, which could indicate he had some kind of head trauma or may have been beaten. The county told us an Animal Control officer was willing to take the dog home to work with it. We later heard a person claiming to be the owner finally contacted Animal Control after six days. We don't know if the County released the puppy to him or not.

Are you prepared? Are you ready when your doorbell rings or when you may see an animal in need? How about an extra dog or cat lead. I have friends who carry leads in their car in case they spot a stray cat or dog. Do you know what city or county department to call in your area? Do you have their phone numbers handy? You can call the shelter for help but remember, our staff isn't always there to answer your questions. Please don't bring a stray to the shelter without contacting our staff first. Ed Cryer

# From the President - ADDITION PROPERTY ACQUSITION

After many months of negotiations, we have been able to purchase the property to the south (4323 Stonewall) of the two properties we presently own. In our forward planning of a new building, we have had a problem with what we should do about our existing facility. We were thinking that we would have only two temporary alternatives; shutting down while the construction was going on or relocating the shelter to some other location. Either of these solutions would have had a time span of at least 1 year or more. This additional property will allow us to build a new facility using our second property as well as this newly purchased real estate for the new building. The existing facilities would stay until we were moved into the new building at which time the old buildings would be torn down and the area would become additional parking. Our new building will have space for educational classes and meeting space to help serve the community. As you probably know, we have struggled with the parking issue for years so the additional space will be a big help.

Well, that was the good news! Now for the reality news; a new building is not in the plans for the near future. We could start a large capital campaign; however the professional fundraising experts are warning us that it is not a good time due to economic concerns by the general public and their willingness to support our effort much less having to pay their own bills. A campaign would also negatively impact our ongoing needs for support of our existing facilities and its maintenance.

We could get a mortgage, however our concern is if something happens which impacts the economy and draws financial support away from WSHS, then we would stand a chance of having to default on our mortgage and lose our shelter. This is not a risk the Board is willing to take at this point in time.

This doesn't mean the Board isn't working on this new building project. There is a lot of work to be done prior to the start of construction, and that effort will continue.
