Getting started is easy . . .


It only takes a few minutes to create your online fundraising page.

Pet Health Watch by Dr. Main, DVM

What is osteoarthritis and what can be done to manage the condition?

By definition Osteoarthritis is the pathological process of cartilage degeneration in mammalian joints. The symptoms or signs of the disease are morning stiffness, lameness after heavy exercise, or at times non-weight bearing lameness. Arthritis is usually caused by something that alters the normal function of the joint. This could include hip dysplasia, elbow dysplasia, ligament injuries, as well as many other conditions.

Once the pet begins to get extra wear and tear on the joints, the joint itself begins to produce destructive enzymes and other chemicals that fuel the fire of inflammation. In fact when cartilage is injured, the cartilage itself produces destructive enzymes, which then lead to further damage and inflammation. Hence, arthritis is a progressive disease. It is an ongoing circle of inflammation and cartilage injury.

There are many therapies available for the treatment of arthritis. These treatments range from joint supplements that help repair damaged cartilage, to anti-inflammatory drugs, as well as omega-3 fatty acids and other pain medications. In addition surgical procedures to fix underlying problems associated with the joint, or even joint replacements are part of arthritis therapies.

In addition to the above therapies, there is something very new and exciting in the treatment of arthritis. This new therapy involves the use of **stem cells** to treat damaged joints.

Stem cells are precursor cells; this means they are undifferentiated cells with the potential to develop into any number of cell types in the body including cartilage or other tissue type. Stem cells are the origin of all other cells they just have not differentiated into a tissue type yet. These unique cells hold the answer to treating many diseases in the future. For now these cells can be used in the treatment of canine arthritis.

How does this work?

As it turns out body fat and in particular falciform fat which lies just under the umbilicus is an excellent source of stem cells in the dog. Vet-Stem is a medical company that has developed techniques to isolate these cells for medical use.

Let's take a look at what would happen in an actual case.

The patient with arthritis undergoes a minor surgical procedure to harvest falciform fat from the body.

This fat is then shipped urgently to Vet-Stem for isolation of the stem cells. The stem cells which are now isolated and contained in syringes for injectable use are urgently shipped back to the veterinary hospital. The patient is

then readmitted to the hospital so that the stem cells can be injected directly into the arthritic joints of the patient.

Over the next month, the stem cells take on the identity of healthy normal cartilage cells as well as joint capsule cells and begin to return the joint to a healthy state. The stem cells do not correct underlying problems like hip dysplasia, but they do substantially help to return the joint to a healthy state.

Although this is a new procedure, the results thus far have been very promising. The potential for stem cell therapies in veterinary medicine is phenomenal. This work is truly the beginning of a new era in medicine.

Veterinarians must be certified to perform this procedure. There is a list of certified veterinarians in Illinois at www.vet-stem.com which includes Dr. Tyson Grover and Dr. Jeff Vidt of West Suburban Veterinary Associates.
