A Tale of Two Kitties

This is the tale of two kitties. Really, there is only me, but I feel like I have been two different cats. My name is Minikin and

this is my story. Back in 2003 on a frigid January evening, I was found, a lonely little kitten, in Joliet, IL. I was taken to Joliet Animal Control and it was there that a staff member from West Suburban Humane Society saw me, scared and alone in a cage. She was picking up dogs to bring back to WSHS, but took

pity on me and scooped me up

as well. I settled into life at the shelter pretty well and soon a family came along who wanted to make me part of their family. I was so happy in my home. There were kids and other cats to play with and I could lounge on a bed or in the sun whenever I wanted. It was a joyous life of fun and freedom. Then, after four years of blissful living, my family fell on hard times and had to move to a place that didn't allow cats. Can you imagine a place where we wouldn't be welcome? Anyway, this was devastating to me. I was so anxious and fearful to be ripped from my home and placed in a wire cage, surrounded by others in the same predicament. None of us could understand what we had done wrong to land us here. All I had to cling to was the hope that this would be temporary

and that my family would come back for me. I watched and I waited and I paced my cage, but they never came back. That is when I became a different cat.

Loss of hope can really change a person, and it's like that for cats too. As time went on, I became more and more depressed. I am ashamed to say that I became difficult to manage and eventually, none of the volunteers wanted to spend time with me. I don't blame them. I was acting very bratty for a very long time. After a while I just let myself go. No one could trim my nails and I used them on everyone who tried to interact with me. I stopped cleaning myself and became covered in mats, but I wouldn't allow staffers to try and groom me. Finally, it got so bad, they had to take me to a vet where I was sedated and shaved completely. These were the darkest years of my life and I just didn't know how to ask for help.

Now here it is, 2009. I am seven years old and I have finally been given my chance. I guess the complaints about my behavior in the cattery became so frequent, I was recently moved to a space in a different building. Here I am away from most of the barking dogs and I am allowed out of my cage to roam the building like a regular cat every couple of days. This change alone has allowed me to feel hope again. My favorite times are when I am out. I love to be with people and "helping" with the chores around here. I help stock the food and I help in the office. If

there are people working, I am there. They love it when I rub myself all over them and flop down for a belly rub on their work. I am alive again and feeling like my old self. I almost didn't recognize me; it has been two years since I lost my home.

I am confident my time is coming soon. I have a nice large spot right by the front door here where I can see all of the comings and goings. Everyone says how beautiful my long, tricolored fur is. I just have one or two requests for my forever home. I am afraid of dogs and it has been a really long time since I lived with cats, so I may do best as an only pet. I was good with kids in my last home, but really little ones might pull on my luxurious coat by accident, so older kids might work out best for me.

This tale of two kitties will have a happy ending. It just hasn't been written yet.




3 year old, Female, Grey Tabby DSH

HEARTY THANKS

Dawn Mchugh of Downers Grove raised \$155 for a church project and donated it to the humane society.

The American Government Class of York Community High School completed a civic action project. They sold cookies and used the money to purchase items from our wish list. The students collected numerous food and supply donations for the animals at the shelter.

The **SASED Multi Needs students at Westmont High School** sold dog treats to raise money for the shelter. They raised a total of \$120.

Pet Health Watch by Dr. Main, DVM

How do I know when it's time to euthanize my aging dog?

It was a bitter cold winter evening in mid-December. I was on my way to a local restaurant to pick-up a turkey dinner for my golden retriever, Jenna. While that may seem odd, it was a test of sorts because Jenna's appetite was starting to diminish. In a few days, Jenna was turning 13 years old and had health issues. Was it time?

While driving to the restaurant, my thoughts turned to the day my wife and I first laid eyes on her. Of a litter of nine, she was the only puppy to walk over to us. It was as if Jenna had picked us rather than my wife and me picking her. It was love at first sight for all of us. Thoughts of her filled my mind: Jenna loved chasing seagulls, swimming in the ocean, taking a pair of socks out of the laundry and having a family member chase her around the house. Jenna loved to take walks, wrestle, and play in the snow and turkey dinners. How could it be time so soon?

Jenna had been through chemotherapy for lymphoma at the age of eight. The summer of 2008 she had a malignant intestinal mass removed from her small intestine. In the fall, ultrasound studies showed a mass and some nodules in her liver. Jenna clearly had her problems, but she always seemed to bounce back. Jenna's patience, love and devotion to her family seemed to sustain her. She always stayed near us and relished all the affection showed to her. She was always happy to see us and

greeted us at the door, but things were changing. Her walks were reduced to 4 or 5 houses down the block before she would tire. She struggled to get up to greet us and she didn't eat the turkey dinner.

My wife and I anguished over the decision when to euthanize Jenna. Our hearts were breaking. The anguish, the sorrow, and the responsibility of making the decision were pounding on us. How could we let her go, but it was time.

Jenna being Jenna took care of everything. It was a Friday afternoon, on December 12th that Jenna's liver tumor began to bleed. My wife and I were with her as she went quite peacefully and quickly. Despite the knowledge of her medical condition, and her age, we were heartbroken.

It's been four months since Jenna's death. Her two buddies Jacques and Sadie have also recently passed away by humane euthanasia. They too were old with many medical problems.


Throughout my professional career, I have given advice about how to make the decision for euthanasia. The signs are many: consistent inappetance, pain, senility, soiling, immobility, or other significant behavioral changes. There is usually a medical reason for these changes, but the decision is almost always based on the behavior of the pet. With this in mind the decision for euthanasia is made carefully and to the best of our ability. The decision is almost always valid and correct despite being a very difficult and painful process. Looking back at Jenna, Jacques and Sadie, I know it was their time. If anything, we may have waited just a bit too long to put them to rest. The turmoil of making the end of life decision comes with the territory. Simply put, letting go of something you love and determining when it is their time, is no easy task.

As much as we agonize over the difficult decisions, I know with my own, definite suffering was prevented. I am grateful for the option of humane euthanasia, but it's truly a bear. In the end, it is our human struggle, our careful decision making and our love for our animal companions that preserves their dignity and limits their suffering.
