Volunteer-You Can Make a Difference

Now that summer is here, maybe you are finding yourself with a little more time on your hands. Would you like to have fun and make a difference in the community? Consider volunteering. Volunteering is a fun, rewarding experience! We have a variety of volunteer opportunities available.

 Work for three hours on a weekday or weekend morning, helping to clean, feed and medicate the animals. It may not seem like a very glamorous job but it is a necessity and you can bet the animals sure do appreciate it!



- Volunteer during our open hours and act as an adoption counselor.
 Adoption counselors' work with the public to assist them in finding an animal that best suits their lifestyle and family situation. There is nothing quite as rewarding as when a great match is made and an animal finds a permanent loving home.
- Work at a fundraising event. While
 this does not involve working directly
 with the animals it is still very
 important. Without the appropriate
 funds we would not be able to
 properly care for the animals.
- Come in for a few hours and spend one on one quality time with an animal. Walk them, play with them, brush them and give them the TLC that they desperately need and deserve.

• Sign up to be a temporary care home for a needy dog or cat. It can be a lot of work but the positives definitely outweigh the negatives. Some of the animals that come into the shelter have been neglected, abused or have not had any training. They need to be socialized and learn basic obedience commands. Sometimes the animals are pregnant and need to be in a temporary care home until they have their babies and the babies are old enough to be adopted. Image the satisfaction of helping these animals get ready to be adopted and find a home of their own. There is nothing quite like it.

If you are interested in volunteering, you can start by attending one of our New Volunteer Orientations. Saturday orientations start at 9:00 am and Wednesday orientations start at 6:30 pm. All orientations will last approximately 1 hour. Registration is not required for your attendance. The dates for the rest of the year are:

August 12th and 26th September 9th and 23rd October 7th and 21st November 4th and 18th December 2nd, 16th and 30th

Pet Watch by Dr. Ken Eisenberg, DVM

Dear Dr. Eisenberg:

I recently adopted a dog that has had all his vaccinations except the rabies vaccine. I was told he would need this vaccine and that it had to be given by my vet. What is rabies? Does my dog really need this vaccination because I always worry about over vaccinating my pet?

Dear Rabid Fan:

Rabies is a disease caused by a rhabdovirus and it has been one of the most feared infections throughout history. According to the Illinois Department of Public Health statistics reported for 2005 there were 51 positive cases of rabies documented in animals in Illinois. DuPage County reported 2 cases of rabies in bats. Although there were no reported case of rabies in dogs, cats, or humans, it was found in bats, cows, foxes, and skunks in Illinois. It is evident the virus is still present in the wildlife of Illinois and needs to be controlled.

The virus is present in an infected animal's saliva and is most often transmitted via a bite wound. Once inside the wound the virus attaches to muscle cells. It then penetrates the nervous tissue and slowly progresses to the brain tissue. Once the virus in inside the nervous system it cannot be attacked by the host's immune system. This slow progression can take as long as one year but usually takes 20 to 30 days. Once inside the brain it proceeds to become segregated throughout the body, including the victim's saliva. It is at this point the virus can again be transmitted to another victim and the symptoms of the virus become evident. These symptoms area called stages and they consist of the Prodromal, Excitative, and Paralytic or Dumb stage. This final stage is when the respiratory muscles become paralyzed and the animal soon dies. Most human exposure occurs during this final stage.

It is a state law in Illinois that all dogs be vaccinated against the rabies virus with an approved killed vaccine that must be given be a licensed veterinarian. The duration of the immunity may vary from one to three years depending on the vaccine used. Local laws govern other pets and their rabies requirements. In DuPage County, for example, all cats are required to be vaccinated with the rabies vaccine. For any dog or cat that is receiving the vaccine for the first time, a booster is required in one year. This booster can then be a one-year or threeyear vaccine. The vaccines are safe and effective. Your veterinarian can further explain the benefits of the vaccine and alleviate any other concerns you may have.

Did you know.....

The shelter receives about 3,500 visitors a year, not counting the dedicated volunteers that come and go throughout the normal business and non-business hours. At any point in time, we have 40-60 animals in our trusted care, at the shelter, before permanent homes are found for them. The job of keeping our kennel and cattery clean and healthy is a 7 day a week - 365 days a year effort. This includes cleaning the inside cages, cleaning the outside dog runs, washing the food and water bowls, feeding our temporary 4-legged guests and, best of all; "playing" with our furry guests. A lot of volunteer and staff work hours go into this effort to maintain the health standards that are set by both our charter and mandated laws.

Did you know there are 3 shifts per day focused on taking care of the cats and another 3 shifts per day taking care of the dogs? If you count each person per shift, there are 150 volunteers staffing this monumental job and that's not counting

the efforts of our staff! Many of the shifts are understaffed and one of the shifts has no volunteer support at all, 3 shifts have only 1 person doing the work and many others have only 2 people helping out the best they can. Another 20-30 volunteers are needed to properly support these overall efforts. None of these numbers allow for sickness or vacation coverage.

Our greatest need is our weekday morning shifts and our weekday midday support shifts. If you find you have some time (1 to 3 hours) and would like to help us out, please contact Rebecca Kohler (630-960-9600x45) for further information. CAUTION: There is no monetary award for your work; however, there is occasional purr, lick and/or wag of a tail. How much is it worth to you knowing that you are able to make an enjoyable difference in an animal's life?
